Student B responses

- 1. Well, I take your point about possible health concerns, but they've got to go somewhere. We're practically all mobile phone users. If there are health issues, and I don't think it's been proved conclusively yet, someone's always going to be at risk. Do you see what I'm saying?
- 2. Do you mean because it might be a health hazard?
- **3.** In what way? Are you talking about the residents, the school children, mobile phone users in general or the mobile phone companies? I'm not sure I understand who you mean?
- **4.** Well, then I think it's the government's responsibility to regulate the companies more and commission more independent research.
- **5.** But surely, there might be children or even babies nearby, wherever you put a mast in a residential district. It seems to me that people protest when they are directly affected, otherwise they're quite happy for the mast to go up in someone else's neighbourhood, as long as they can get a strong enough signal.
- 6. Generally speaking, yes. I'm sure most, if not, all the people protesting against the mast near the school are directly affected. Regarding what you said earlier about 'restrictions', I don't see how such restrictions on location can be fair to everyone. If you're a mobile phone user, then you have to accept some element of risk associated with masts.
